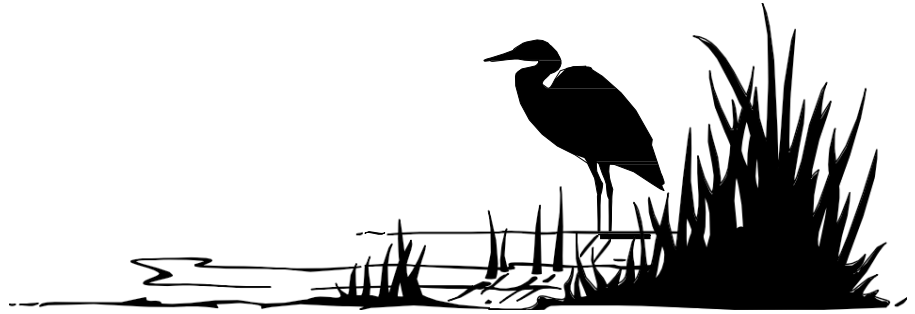

During our February 27th meeting, we heard from our Club Foundation members.



Larry began by sharing the reason that we have a Rotary Club, and a Rotary Foundation. Our Foundation is set up as a [A \(501-c-4 Corporation\)](#). If we didn't set this up then we would not be able to make tax deductible donations.

Larry explained that when Rotary was set up, it was with the intention of giving back to our community.

Rotary International (RI) – Founded 1905. Motto: Service Above Self. Mission Statement: The mission of Rotary International is to provide service to others, promote integrity, and advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through its fellowship of business, professional, and community leaders.

In an explanation of History, it was fun to learn that in 1917 when Arch Klump left the Atlanta convention, there was \$26.56 left over. Arch Klump decided to put that into a foundation he named the Paul Harris Foundation. He went on to explain that nothing really happened with that fund until 1947 when Paul Harris Passed away and then the Foundation Really Came Alive to become what it is today!

Paul Harris Fellows. The Paul Harris Fellow program recognizes individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. The honor was established in 1957 to show appreciation for contributions that support our Annual Fund, PolioPlus, or an approved Foundation grant.

Individual recognition

- **Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member**, when you give \$100 or more per year to the Annual Fund.
- **Benefactor**, when you include the Endowment Fund as a beneficiary in your estate plans or when you donate \$1,000 or more to the fund outright. Benefactors receive a certificate and insignia to wear with a Rotary or Paul Harris Fellow pin.
- **Paul Harris Fellow**, when you give \$1,000 or more to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus, or an approved Foundation grant. To recognize someone else as a Paul Harris Fellow, you can give that amount in their name. You are recognized as a Multiple Paul Harris Fellow with each additional gift of \$1,000.
- **Paul Harris Society** member, when you give \$1,000 or more annually to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus, or an approved Foundation grant.
- **Bequest Society** member, when you give \$10,000 or more via your estate plans. All society members receive recognition from the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation, and donors can choose to receive an engraved crystal recognition piece and a Bequest Society pin.

- **Major Donor**, when your cumulative donations reach \$10,000. You can choose to receive a crystal recognition piece and a Major Donor lapel pin or pendant. Recognition items commemorate giving at these levels:
 - Level 1: \$10,000 to \$24,999
 - Level 2: \$25,000 to \$49,999
 - Level 3: \$50,000 to \$99,999
 - Level 4: \$100,000 to \$249,999
- **Arch C. Klumph Society**, when your cumulative giving reaches \$250,000. We will invite you to an induction ceremony at the Rotary International headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA and include your picture and biography in the Arch C. Klumph Society interactive gallery. You will also receive invitations to society events, along with membership pins and crystals that commemorate giving at these levels:
 - Trustees Circle: \$250,000 to \$499,999
 - Chair's Circle: \$500,000 to \$999,999
 - Foundation Circle: \$1 million and above

Club banner recognition

- **100% Paul Harris Fellow Club**, for clubs in which all dues-paying members are Paul Harris Fellows. This is a one-time recognition. Please contact your district governor to receive this banner.
- **100% Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Club**, in which every dues-paying member personally gives \$100 or more to the Annual Fund. Awarded annually at the end of the Rotary year.
- **Every Rotarian, Every Year Club**, for clubs that achieve a minimum \$100 per capita with all dues-paying members contributing some amount to the Annual Fund. Awarded annually at the end of the Rotary year.
- **Top Three Per Capita in Annual Fund Giving**, for the top three per capita giving clubs in each district. Clubs that give at least \$50 per capita to the Annual Fund are eligible. Awarded annually at the end of the Rotary year.

Beverly Dahlstrom Followed Larry. Beverly shared that Rotary International is dedicated to six areas of focus in order to build international relationships, improve lives, create a better world to support our peace efforts and end polio forever. To achieve those goals Rotary takes action with the following specific programs...

Promoting Peace, Fighting disease, Providing clean water, sanitation, and hygiene, Saving mothers and children, Supporting education and Growing local economies.

So lets look at the larger picture regarding Promoting Peace today....

Conflict and violence displace millions of people each year. Half of those killed in conflict are children and 90% are civilians. 65 million people are currently displaced by armed conflict or persecution. That is three times the population of New York State (currently about 20million) plus 5 million more.

Rotary Members take action to address the underlying causes of these conflicts which include poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

So how does Rotary address these areas of focus internationally for promoting peace?

Rotary projects provide training that fosters understanding and provides communities with the skills to resolve conflicts through 1. service projects2. peace fellowships.... 3. and scholarships.

Service Projects - Here is an example of three

Rotary Members founded the People for People Foundation. This foundation has helped 10,000 families afford food, clothing, rent, medications, utilities, and other necessities.

Rotaract clubs in the Philippines conduct antibullying campaigns in schools to teach children how to handle conflict peacefully from an early age.

The Rotarian Action Group for Peace gives Rotary members resources and support to advance world peace and turn ambitious ideas into life changing realities

Peace Fellowships

100 Peace fellowships are offered each year at Rotary Peace Centers around the world in a globally competitive process based on personal, academic, and professional achievements. 1,000 students have graduated from Rotary's Peace Centers program.

Rotary Peace Centers offer academic training, practice and global networking opportunities. The Peace Centers programs develop leaders who become catalysts for peace, conflict prevention and resolution. Fellows earn a master's-level degree or a professional development certificate in peace and conflict



studies. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.

Each year Rotary Foundation awards up to 50 fellowships for master's degrees and 50 for certificate studies at premier universities around the world.

In the past ten years, Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,000 fellows for careers in peace building. Many serve as leaders at international organizations or have started their own foundations.

In the US there is a Peace Center at Duke University. There are 5 other locations around the world where Peace Centers are located. These countries include Australia, England, Sweden, Japan and Thailand.

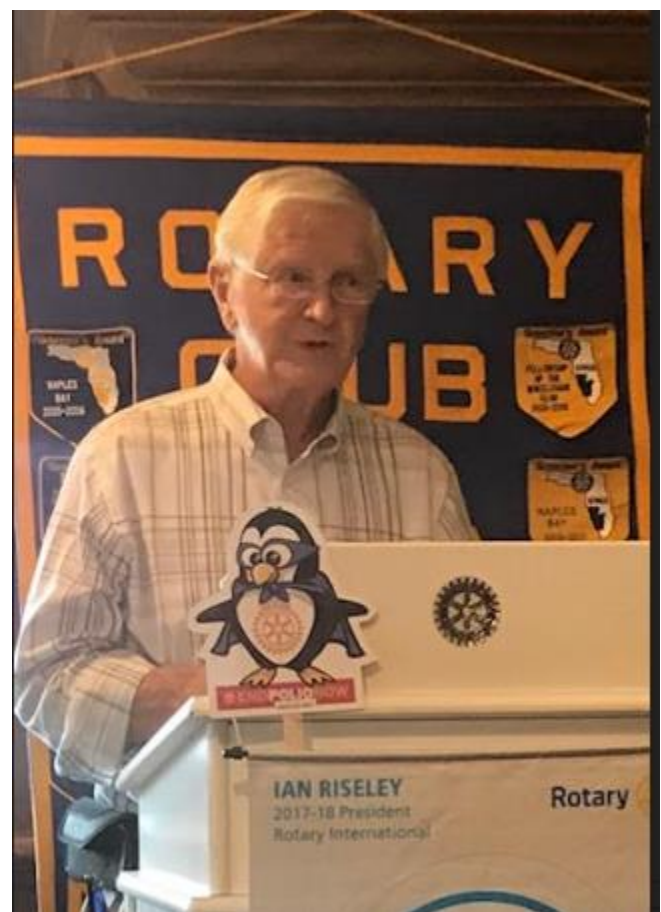
36% of Peace graduates work in nongovernmental organizations. 15% work in government agencies.

The balance of Peace graduates work in a variety of careers such as at the United Nations, in law enforcement, teaching and journalism.

Within the Rotary Foundation are Educational Programs. One was called The Ambassadorial Scholarships program, founded in 1947 and was the largest non-governmental and most international scholarship program in the world. Scholars studied in a country other than their own, where they serve as unofficial ambassadors of goodwill. Over 37,000 scholars from 110 countries received scholarships at a cost of almost 447 million dollars. The program ended in 2013. Today, the scholarships are now funded by district and global grants and are offered directly through Rotary Clubs.

Each of Rotary's Peace projects and service projects help promote understanding and relationship between nations facing wars in the hopes that through Rotary, we may see peace and prosperity as the future for these countries who face major conflicts.

Beverly was Followed by Bill Jones, Bill is the President of our Foundation. Bill explained that the Foundation programs are not just for Rotarians. Rotary spent 3.7 Billion promoting projects such as Promoting peace and Ending Polio. The RI Foundation helped 19,000 Children learn how to read. We as a club also have announced local scholarships. Bill Shared the letter from Haris that has taken the reigns on our scholarship:

The Rotary Club of Naples Bay announced that applications for the 2018 scholarships are now available. Rotary International, with more than 1.2 million members in 34,000 clubs worldwide, is a volunteer organization of business and professional men and women who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards, and help build goodwill and peace in the world through charitable endeavors. Through the Naples Bay Rotary Foundation, the Naples Bay Rotary Club will be awarding one or more scholarships this year.

The scholarships are endowed from The Naples Bay Foundation separate funds that honor the memory and contributions of Rotarians present and past. This year the Rotary Club will be giving scholarships to a selected student(s) which will be awarded on the basis of participation in community service projects that best demonstrate the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self". This service can be local, regional or international in scope.

To be eligible a student must be a high school senior, a resident of Naples, FL, and graduating in 2018 from a Golden Gate High School. The student must also be accepted to an accredited institution of higher learning or an accredited technical or vocational school training program. We had a surprise extra speaker. Because of his love for the foundation **Lou Marciano** stood to share with us the experiences that he has had with working on projects through the RI Foundation.

Lou expressed his desire to see if our club would look into sponsoring a water project. He said that there are people that don't have water for day to day necessities including cooking and bathing. He reminded us what it was like to be without water for a few days after Hurricane Irma.

"Water can be very important to us, today there are close to 7.5 Billion people on this earth and in 2 or 3 years there will be 8 Billion. By then we would have hoped to solve some of the problems."

Rotary has a list of locations that need help with water projects including water clean ups. He suggested that desalination could be very important in the future, but the problem with desalination is that we then have to figure out what to do with the salt that is left over. Canada and 2 or 3 other countries have been doing some desalination.

Lou shared that we can find a water project at Rotary Internationals Website

Lou also explained that we can raise funds as a club by applying for funds through RI foundation. He said last year more that \$100M was given out by the RI Foundation.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU! This week's feature – Wayne Dahlstrom

GOLF, with "THE FIRST TEE"



My first career was in International Sales and Marketing, Vice President level, for three world leaders in the construction equipment manufacturing field. I have traveled to over 70 countries, for 20 plus years and was fortunate to play golf during this time in 24 countries.

I retired early and decided to get into the golf industry and moved from Baltimore, Maryland, to Naples, in 2000, where I purchased The Briarwood Golf and Practice Center. The past 19 years have been interesting and very rewarding, in learning all areas of the golf industry.

I went through the PGA program being exposed to their 19 areas of concentration and eventually decided to focus on teaching. I am a

member of The United States Golf Teachers Federation and The World Golf Teachers Federation. I am honored to have been selected from their membership of 23,000, from 42 countries, as one of their TOP 100 Teachers, for the past 8 years.

Today, my focus continues to be, golf instruction, through THE WAYNE DAHLSTROM GOLF ACADEMY.

I maintain teaching operations at Riviera Golf Club and Lakewood Country Club of Naples, for all levels of players. I am also a Certified Golf Instructor for Special Olympics and The First Tee.

The First Tee was formed in 1997 and its mission is to "Impact the lives of young people by providing educational programs that build character, instill life-enhancing values and promote healthy choices through the game of golf".



We work with young people from 7 to 17 years of age, through over 2,000 chapters, in all 50 states. In the last 20 years over 5,000,000 young people have gone through the First Tee program. Each session is one day a week, for 1/2 hours and range from 6 to 8 weeks in length, based on the players skill level.

The Nine Core values of the First Tee are- honesty, integrity, sportsmanship, respect, confidence, responsibility, perseverance, courtesy, and judgment.
