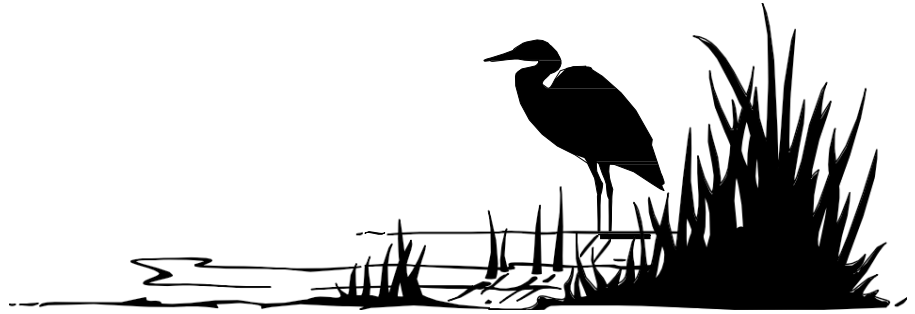

On May 22 we heard from Blake Adams – Assistant Public Defender. Blake Adams has been an Assistant Public Defender with the Law Offices of Kathleen A. Smith, Public Defender 20th Judicial Circuit, for more than four years where he represents clients charged with felonies in Circuit Court. He is also the Collier County Deputy Chief supervising the Agency’s attorneys practicing in County Court and Juvenile Court. Blake graduated from William Jewell College with a Bachelor of Arts in International Commerce and Diplomacy.

For approximately ten years, Blake worked in the financial services industry in retail investments, banking, and residential mortgages. Blake then attended the University of Tulsa where he graduated with a Juris Doctor and Master of Business Administration. Immediately following graduate school, Blake became a temporary faculty member at the University of Tulsa College of Law as a member of the teaching team for “Introduction to Legal Research” to first-year law students. In January 2010, Blake joined the 20th Judicial Circuit as a Staff Attorney where he worked for the Circuit Court judges until April 2014. As a Staff Attorney, Blake worked with more than thirty judges and wrote more than 900 court orders, appellate opinions, and legal memoranda. Blake will be on the August 28th ballot as a candidate for Collier County Court Judge.



History of Right to Counsel by the Criminally Accused and Public Defenders

US Constitution, 6th Amendment: Guarantees anyone within US accused of crime will have effective assistance of counsel. “In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right . . . to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.”

In 1932, US Supreme Court was mandated that the indigent accused in capital cases in all states must be guaranteed counsel, applying the 14th Amendment to the 6th Amendment in Powell v. Alabama, 287 U.S. 45 (1932). With this ruling, the Court set a precedent—under the Due Process Clause of the 14th Amendment, counsel must be guaranteed to everyone facing a possible death sentence, whether in State or federal court. However, the US Supreme Court did not decide whether defendants facing non-capital cases should be guaranteed the right to counsel.

Six years later in 1938, the US Supreme Court extended the right to counsel in non-capital federal cases, but did not extend it to the State Courts. Johnson v. Zerbst, 304 US 458 (1938).

In 1942 in Betts v. Brady, 316 US 455 (1942), the US Supreme Court denied the right to counsel to indigent defendants accused of non-capital offenses when prosecuted by a state. Justice Hugo Black said in his dissent that the denial of counsel based on financial stability makes it so that those in poverty have an increased chance of conviction, which is not equal protection of the laws under the Fourteenth Amendment.

Twenty-one years later, in a unanimous opinion, the US Supreme Court deemed the right to counsel so fundamental that it mandated effective assistance of counsel in virtually all criminal cases in the landmark decision: Gideon v. Wainwright, 372 U.S. 335 (1963). This case originated from Florida. Gideon was charged with breaking into a pool hall with the intent to commit a crime therein—a felony under Florida Law (burglary). Trial court ruled that it could not appoint counsel to represent him, so he had to represent himself. The US Supreme Court analyzed its ruling in Betts and determined that it got it wrong. In overturning Betts, Justice Hugo Black who wrote the majority opinion this time, stated that “reason and reflection require us to recognize that in our adversary system of criminal justice, any person haled into court, who is too poor to hire a lawyer, cannot be assured a fair trial unless counsel is provided for him.” He further wrote that the “noble ideal” of “fair trials before impartial tribunals in which ever defendant

stands equal before the law . . . cannot be realized if the poor man charged with crime has to face his accusers without a lawyer to assist him.” Gideon’s case was overturned that remanded to the Florida Supreme Court, at which point public defenders for each of Florida’s circuit courts was mandated.

It wasn’t until 1972 that Article 5, section 18, of Florida Constitution was adopted. “SECTION 18. Public defenders.—In each judicial circuit a public defender shall be elected for a term of four years, who shall perform duties prescribed by general law. A public defender shall be an elector of the state and reside in the territorial jurisdiction of the circuit and shall be and have been a member of the Bar of Florida for the preceding five years. Public defenders shall appoint such assistant public defenders as may be authorized by law.”

Only other states that elect public defenders include Nebraska, Tennessee, and parts of California.
