### **Our Program, October 30, 2018**

Stephanie Clark has a Masters in Higher Education Administration and had spent over 7 years working in public and private higher educational institutions. She has worked with undergraduate graduate and perspective high school students with regards to academic and social issues regarding higher education. She also served on scholarship committees and program boards.

For the "TSA" generation, also known as the "iPad" generation, applying and getting a college degree is a lot different than it was 10 years ago. The first thing I suggest parents do with their high school student, or if that has passed college student, is to have a real conversation with their student regarding finances and education. The students want to be treated as adults and one way to do this is to speak to them regarding what school will actually cost. Where is the student looking at going and what does that school cost? If the student has a job in mind, how much do individuals coming out of college usually make their first year? Does the student have a 529 account and what does that actually cover? Does the student have scholarships and what does that cover? If the parents or students need to take out loans, how much interest will they actually pay in 5, 10 or 20 years? Taking out loans is not a bad thing, as long as you know everything involved with it and what it means to pay it back.



College can be an overwhelming experience, and although this new generation has a great entrepreneurial spirit and is less bound by boundaries, they have different concerns and issues than their predecessors. Does the school have the resources to assist the student? What type of internship or volunteer opportunities are available. Is the teacher or TA accessible during office hours and what does office hours look like? How many students who graduate with the perspective degree get a job in that field within the first year? What type of counseling services and/or tutoring does the school offer and how much does that cost? What type of class size is there? How would the student deal with being in a class with over 100 students? Also, a student should always apply for every scholarship out there. The worst that can happen is that they you don't get the money, the best that can happen is that you get free money. A lot of this generation that is headed to college is not as confident in themselves as

they portray. This leads them to think that are not going to get it, so why try. What I like for them to learn is the fact that you won't know unless you try.

A lot of the time Ivy League schools are the goal, but for the student and for what he/she wants to do, is that a good goal? A book that delves into this is *Where You Go Is Not Who You'll Be* by Frank Bruni. It has some interesting facts and stories regarding prominent people and where they went to school and why. For some students community school is a great thing. The cost is normally less and they normally have smaller class sizes. The state of Florida guarantees that students who complete an AA degree at a Florida college have the opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree at a state university or

Florida college offering four-year degrees. Just because a student is at a community college, does not mean that they have to be in their hometown or live at home.

The main thing I like to tell students and parents is that that student needs to be his/her own self-advocate. Learning how to respectfully and affectively be your own self-advocate means that you are informed and are the captain of your own ship. Being an adult comes with good and bad things, but being informed of what you are getting into is never a bad thing.

Please read the following regarding Hurricane Relief!

Operation Tarp the Panhandle is now underway and help is needed from our district! Rotarians from near and far came to help SWFL last year during Hurricane Irma relief (an effort that is still ongoing) and now we have a chance to help those in need following Hurricane Michael.

**Hurricane Michael** was the third-most intense [Atlantic hurricane](#) to make [landfall](#) in the [contiguous United States](#) in terms of [pressure](#), behind the [1935 Labor Day hurricane](#) and [Hurricane Camille](#) of [1969](#). It was also the strongest storm in terms of [maximum sustained wind speed](#) to strike the contiguous United States since [Andrew](#) in [1992](#). In addition, it was the strongest storm on record in the [Florida Panhandle](#), and was the fourth-strongest landfalling hurricane in the contiguous United States, in terms of wind speed.

Please reach out to your club members to see who is able to go and spend a couple days helping to make homes water tight and possibly remove some debris while on site. The biggest need at this point is manpower.

In order to help streamline the process, I am hoping you will reach out to your club to gauge interest in going to the panhandle to help out. Please let me know how many members would be willing to spend a few days helping out and I will help coordinate with the teams on the ground.
